CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The institution follows the academic calendar given by the higher education Madhya Pradesh for proper delivery of curriculum. In our institution students of arts science commerce and law streams are enrolled and for proper delivery of curriculum of all the streams the time table is divided into morning and afternoon shift. Commerce department and law department takes their class in morning shift according to the time table where is arts and science are given afternoon and evening time. There are 6 streams of science are physics chemistry mathematics botany zoology and geology in addition to the self financed courses of biotechnology biochemistry microbiology and Computer sciences. Students are promoted to understand the practical aspect of the curriculum in well equipped and well furnished laboratories institution. According to the academy calendar and time table of our institution the students are allowed to attend the classes immediately after the admission in month of July and it is targeted to complete the syllabus up to February. In between the students are also given CCE for internal assessment. Our college has a rich library with almost all the reference books of arts science commerce and law streams. The schedule caste and schedule tribe students are given

stationery and study material by the library. The library has about 40 computers in a separate study chamber where students sit and search their study material from net and various academic websites. The library also contain question bank from where student can get the types of questions which are asked in previous years and it provides and opportunity to the student to prepare themselves according to the examination pattern. Remedial classes are also planned for socially backward students to complete the syllabus and to make the syllabus understanding to weaker section of student. In remedial classes topics which are important and relevant but difficult for the students are taken in separate time slot so that regular time table does not disturb. The postgraduate students of 4th semester of Arts, science and commerc are promoted to complete a project work which develops research attitude in the student. Departmental library in seperate departments contain reference books related to the syllabus of postgraduate classes. Students are given separate period for library to make notes from these reference books to complete their syllabus.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1. Water harvesting -Water harvesting arrangements are made in college campus. Rainwater is used as distilled water in the departments. 2. Vermicompost- Vermicompost is prepared out of the dry leaves and biodegradable waste. This vermicompost is then further used in botanical Garden and other plants within college campus. Dried leaves and the cuttings of plants are used to make vermicompost, instead of burning it. Department of botany conducts vermicomposting and produces organic manure for plants. 3. Earthen pots and bird nests- In summer season earthen pots filled with water are kept at suitable places to quench the thirst of birds. Installation of bird nests is also done for providing protecting atmosphere to birds. 4. Regular plantation of saplings in the campus and maintenance of the same by NSS/NCC students. 5. Plastic free campus- Single use plastic is ban in the college campus. 6. Save electricity save power -All the electrical gadgets, lights, fans and other appliances are switched off whenever they are not in use. Utmost care is taken to save electricity. 7. Hazardous waste management -The college has exhaust fans and proper ventilation for the release of hazardous gases from lab in the Chemistry laboratory .Special drainage system is installed for the disposal of chemical waste and alkali, acids and other chemicals. They are drained with plenty of water so that they get diluted and ceases to be harmful

Slogans and quotation of Morality and Nationality have been painted on the walls of the college. The lesson of morality that the students should come forward at the times of natural calamities has been taught. The habit to keep away from violence and to secure the public property as well as the property of the college has been developed in them. There is the feeling of fraternity, respect of each religion and respect for women in them. They have developed the habit of working in groups and to bring about perfection in all field so that the nation may progress. College with the help of N.S.S., N.C.C. units has conducted various activities like water conservation drive, Tree plantation, Literacy drive, AIDS workshop, A Blood donation camp (Photos attached) had been organized in the college campus in which 32 units of blood was collected. The cadets of N.C.C. are regularly donating blood in various camps organized by HDFC Bank Balaghat. The N.S.S. units worked on the burning problems of Beti Bachao - Beti Padhao, Swachhata Abhiyan, Stopping the villagers from defecating in the open. The principal of this institute with some of his colleagues had regularly monitored open defecation to make the village ODF. He had monitored the following villages Dini, Navegoan, Ukawa, Dudhara, Chhapavahi. Under the action plan of Health and Hygiene, students have been made aware of the issues of personal hygiene, infection and hygiene practices. As a sign of increasing sensitivity towards the personal hygiene of young women, a vending machine for sanitary pads with electric incinerator has been setup in the washroom of the college and the hostel. It is the first college of the city to install this facility. The machine dispenses a pack of one pad after a coin of Rs.5 is inserted. The used napkin can hygienically be disposed of in the electric incinerator. This vending machine is an ideal solution for emergency faced by the students. The students have welcomed this facility. The proper disposal of used pads in incinerator helps to keeping the environment clean.
